

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The vanity table that knows no cultural borders

One of few Emirati design professionals to emerge internationally, Khalid Shafar's new collection melds art deco romance with industrial Bauhaus characteristics

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Khalid Shafar has earned a reputation as a poster boy for Emirati design. His high-profile collaborations with luxury furniture makers and galleries have produced stunning exhibits including his Headless Horses reworking of a classic chest of drawers for last year's Design Days Dubai festival.

The standout piece of his new range of octagonal-shaped furniture is the Octa Dress, a vanity table, mirror and stool made of marble, metal and buckled together with beautifully crafted leather straps.

The camel leather and eight-sided shapes he has used reflect his local heritage and are key patterns in Arabic and Islamic design.


The designer believes every one of his objects has a story to tell. And if you look at the Little Palm stool and Fallen Palm bench, you can't help but smile at Shafar's quirky sense of humour.

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He is also a keen advocate of UAE design and craftsmanship and has made his showroom Kasa, in the old Ras Al Khor industrial area of Dubai, into a hub for up and coming artists and designers. 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
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
