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Khalid Shafar brings a slice of the Middle East to London

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For his international interactive design debut, Shafar has conjured a contemporary architectural reinterpretation of the Arish – a traditional Gulf house made from palm trees and fronds – which functions as both a sculptural installation and a social space. Called 'The Nomad', an open framework of African teak planks sprout out of a central column arching downwards towards the floor to create a circular shelter. Within its walls, visitors can take a nap, meet, eat and drink on the curved bench system that lies within. The design of the freestanding structure was one of several proposals conceived by Khalid for a public seating design for d3's new creative community in Dubai, UAE.

'Collaborations and co-creations are at the heart of what we do at d3,' says
Lindsay Miller, Managing Director at d3, which is set to unveil the first stage of
its vast development in October. 'So we are delighted to have partnered with
London's popular Shubbak Festival, which will showcase fantastic installations
such as The Nomad. The festival also provides the d3 team with an opportunity
to acquire new insight and expertise on global design trends that may support
the successful development of our own creative community.'

Installed in the grounds of the Rootstein Hopkins Parade Ground at Chelsea College until 26 July, the Nomad will make its way to d3 later this year in time for Dubai Design Week, where Khalid hopes it will inspire new emerging designers.
